# Japan's Legal System

Japan has one of the most law-abiding and safe societies in the world. The crime rate is low and almost everywhere you go you feel safe and secure at all times. How many of us, during a visit to Japan, have had the experience of leaving behind a phone, wallet or purse in a restaurant or shop, only to be chased down by an anxious shop assistant or waiter who is desperate to return our lost property? Every yen will still be in the wallet or purse!

Yet behind the law-abiding exterior there are issues to be aware of and things to pray about. The conviction rate for cases which come

to court in Japan is 99.9% which is astonishing (the rate in England is 81.0%). Following conviction, many cases result in a suspended sentence or the imposition of a fine, as wrongdoers admit their guilt and express remorse for their crimes. In Japan those who are arrested do not have the right to have a lawyer present during their interview by the police. The bulk of prosecutions are supported by confessions which are obtained by the police during secret interviews with suspects. Recording of these interviews is not permitted.

While judges are supposed to be impartial and to listen to prosecution and defence to ascertain the facts, the prosecution has a heavy influence over the judiciary and

there has been evidence of judges being unwilling to acquit defendants due to prosecution pressure. Any acquittal is immediately appealed to a higher court and a reversal would involve massive loss of face by the acquitting judge, with all the negative cultural consequences this would lead to, within Japanese society.


Prosecutors are also under huge pressure to ensure that their record of securing convictions is not tarnished. Culturally, many factors are at play. Most importantly, Japanese people are very law-abiding and honest. Crime rates are low, particularly violent crimes. However please pray that everyone who is accused of

wrongdoing has access to a fair trial and that the police and prosecutors will exercise their responsibilities fairly and seek to uphold justice in all situations. Pray that all judges in Japan will presume those brought to trial are innocent until proven guilty beyond reasonable doubt.

## **Japanese Leaders' Initiatives**

Japan's society has been ageing for some decades and has the highest proportion of over 65s in the world ... and this proportion is increasing. In another trend, fewer Christians have been choosing to train for church leadership roles and it's thought that over half of church pastors are now over 70 with fewer than 10% of them under 50. A steady stream of retiring pastors with few natural successors in the pipeline, along with the fact that until recently there was little emphasis on training and developing "lay" leaders, is precipitating a serious and growing lack of mature leadership

within the Body of Christ in Japan.

Against this background, the Caleb ministry was begun some 18 years ago by Goro Ogawa, former national director of the Navigators Japan until 1992, with the aim of raising up and empowering leaders who, although more senior in years, are still willing and able to play a key role in the advance of the gospel in Japan. Goro Ogawa himself is now into his 80s and is aiming to continue his involvement in this ministry as long as God grants him health and strength. However he is passing on leadership of Caleb this September to a younger 'senior', Koji Shibusawa, who himself has served for some decades with the Navigators Japan.

Thank the Lord for raising up the Caleb ministry, for Goro Ogawa's part in that, and for raising up a new leader for it in Koji Shibusawa. Pray for him as he commences this new role, for wisdom, love, godliness, strength and vision. Pray also for both these men and others in the Caleb ministry to be fruitful to the end of their days, working to make disciples of many others.
